One Addict's Experience with Step Two

"We came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity."

AGCL: Sheree, what is your understanding of Step Two?

Sheree P: My understanding of step two is believing that a power greater than myself can restore me to sanity. In my process I've been going through a lot of things and I never knew that a power greater than me could restore me to sanity, but through my step work in the second step I found out that I could be restore. Through my step work I started seeing the evidence. I was confuse and baffled a power grater than me started restoring me. Step two is a beautiful step for me!

AGCL: When in your recovery did you realize that you needed the help of a power greater than yourself?

Sheree P: I'd say in my first year, because the first year of recovery was edgy. I had started embarking lot of different experiences, so I say my first year.

AGCL: Was it difficult to admit and accept the need for you to be restored back to sanity by a power greater than yourself?

Sheree P: No not for me.

AGCL: Did you have trouble finding a power greater than yourself?

Sheree P: No, no I didn't have trouble finding a power greater than myself because before recovery I knew of a power greater than me, but I wasn't sure of the power.

AGCL: Who or what was your higher power when you first came to NA? Is that still the case at this point in your recovery?

Sheree P: The Group! It's not the case now, the group is the most power vehicle but the God of my understanding is a power greater

than me that is who I talk to and also who I pray to that is who I deal on a daily basis. When people can't help me or fill the emptiness God can.

AGCL: What spiritual principles did you get out of Step Two?

Sheree P: Sanity, peace, love, humbleness, acceptance and freedom.

AGCL: The second step talks about the void addicts need to fill. How can you identify with the void?

Sheree P: I have found out from my experience that any time I try to put insane stuff in that Spiritual void the more my spirit get clutter and confused. What I started doing is living this step. Working more with my sponsor and getting to learn, know and understand my high power. I stop putting outside stuff in that void and started putting spiritual thing there.

AGCL: Do I have to have a god to live this step?

Sheree P: I don't believe it's necessary, I believe that you just have to believe in a power greater than yourself and a power greater can be the group, your sponsor or the spiritual principles in the first step can be a power greater than you.

AGCL: What is sanity to you?

Sheree P: A sound peace of mind, a sound spirit.

AGCL: Right now, after just leaving a meeting, do you think that you've been restored to sanity?

Sheree P: Yes, because when I'm going through stuff no matter what it is. I go in the meetings and talk about it. No matter how bad it may sound, no matter what I think people think I'll go in the meeting and expose it. I do believe in the fact that the disease dies in the light of exposure. That it itself restores me to sanity. I have always been the type of person to

stuff things, and kept things hidden in myself. I really never had the chance to embark on expressing myself it was only coming in this fellowship and getting with a second step that I was able to free myself. So when I run things across people that I am thinking about or going through when I do my step work its freedom in that for me, that's where the restoration comes in at.

AGCL: What would you say to a newcomer or someone who hasn't done a second step?

Sheree P: You can't do a second step until you've done a first step, and I suggest that when your going through the step process. That you do them with someone who is working and living the twelve steps.

AGCL: Well, Sheree thank you for sharing you're your experience strength and hope with step Two.

Sheree P: Thanks for letting me share.

Step Two - Page 11 IWHW Step Working Guide

Step One strips us of our illusions about addiction; Step Two gives us hope for recovery. The Second Step tells us that what we found out about our addiction in the First Step is not the end of the story. The pain and insanity with which we have been living are unnecessary, says Step Two. They can be relieved and, in time, we will learn to live without them through working the Twelve Steps of Narcotics Anonymous.

The Second Step fills the void we feel when we've finished Step One. As we approach Step Two, we begin to consider that maybe, just maybe, there's a Power greater than ourselves-a Power capable of healing our hurt, calming our confusion, and restoring our sanity.

When we were new in the program, many of us were puzzled by this step's implication that we had been insane. From acknowledging our powerlessness to admitting our "insanity" seemed an awfully large leap. However, after being around the program for a while, we began to understand what this step was really about. We read the Basic Text and found that our insanity was defined there as "repeating the same mistakes and expecting different results." We could certainly relate to that! After all, how many times had we tried to get away with something we had never gotten away with before, each time telling ourselves, "It will be different this time." Now, that's insane! As we live the principles of this step for many years, we discover how deep our insanity actually runs; we often find that the Basic Text definition just scratches the surface.



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One Addict's Experience with Tradition Two

What is the concern of the Second Tradition?

That we allow a loving Higher Power to guide our group conscience.

What is the purpose of the group?

To serve so the message of NA can be carried. In the second tradition we invite God into our group conscience to keep the "mess" from being carried. When we consult a loving higher power regularly ,our collective consciences together guides us in service.

Why is group conscience so vital to the membership?

It is vital because addicts themselves are not capable of making correct decisions constantly. A group conscience allows us to make decisions collectively. The success of the group depends on our willingness as individuals to seek guidance from a higher power.

What is a trusted servant?

Trusted servants are members who serve NA they make decisions through a collective conscience that are best for group purpose and ultimately for the fellowship as a whole.

Have you ever had an experience where you're opinions have interfered with your group conscience? What happened?

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience Our leaders are but trusted servants they do not govern..

I disagreed with a policy and was so upset that I didn't allow myself to be a part of the conscience of the group. I exempted myself and did not vote when I should have.

Have you ever been in service and found yourself governing instead of serving? What were the consequences?

Yes. I usually serve on our area's convention security sub-committee. Even though I was not the chairperson, last year I found myself trying to give more direction and being closed to receiving direction. Since I had the commitment previously, I thought knew everything. I ended up feeling insignificant. I began feeling like I was on the outside looking in because the other members in service knew I was running on my own "s*! #."

Did you ever surrender to selfwill? What were the circumstances?

When I realized that I wasn't actually getting anywhere on the commitment stated previously. I actually had to re-examine why I was there and who was in charge and I made a decision to practice my 1st step and re commit myself to the commitment. As a result, I began to feel a part of again instead of apart from.

What spiritual principles are involved with tradition two?

Faith to know that we are in our higher power's care. Open-mindedness to listen to others because my higher power speaks through others.

Integrity, showing up being dependable and standing by my word, and anonymity, everyone is equally important in making decisions in the group.

How does having a tradition two help you in life outside of NA?

On my job it helps me to be a team player at employee meetings, to listen to views and concerns of others, and to not only think about my own well being but for the well being of the other employees and the company as a whole.

It says in the IWHW that group conscience is not fixed and in flexible can you explain that?

The diverse input of group members allows a group conscience to "bend" & "move" to the needs of the group & fellowship.

Note: Tradition Two Basic Text Pg. 61

In Narcotics Anonymous, we rely on a loving God as He expresses Himself in our group conscience, rather than on personal opinion or ego. In working the steps, we learn to depend on a Power greater than ourselves, and utilize it for our group purposes We must be constantly on guard that our decisions are truly an expression of God's will. There is often a vast difference between group conscience and group opinion, as dictated by powerful personalities or popularity. Some of our most painful growing experiences have come as a result of decisions made in the name of "group conscience". True spiritual principles are never in conflict; they complement each other. The spiritual conscience of a group will never contradict any of our Traditions. The Second Tradition concerns the nature of leadership in N.A. We have learned that for our fellowship, leadership by example and by selfless service works and that direction and manipulation fail. We choose not to have presidents, masters, or directors. Instead we have secretaries, treasurers and representatives. These titles imply service rather than control. Our experience shows that if a group becomes an extension of the personality of a leader or a certain member, it loses its effectiveness. An atmosphere of recovery in our groups is one of our most valued assets, and we must guard it carefully lest we lose it to politics and personalities.

Anger, Resentment and Fear: The Triangle of Self-Obsession.

There was a time when I can recall being really, really angry. I was so angry when I first came to this program, I was out of control. I would throw furniture, lamps etc.

The substance abuse had me acting out on behavior. The anger definitely played a part in my addiction. I resented the fact that those issues I had were stuffed inside of me. The fear took control without my permission. It was just a mess. I was in a relationship just because I was sick with the disease of addiction. I learned through the compulsion and obsession that I was disturbed in my spirit. The Program of NA has allowed to surrender to the God of my understanding on a deeper level.

I am very comforted in this process and it has been a beautiful journey. I believe and trust in the God of my understanding for answers. This God of my understanding has allowed me to accept that mental illness issues are just another type of illness that needs to be addressed daily through reaching out, staying spiritual, getting enough rest and being available to help someone whenever possible. I have learned that God is the ultimate authority. There are many times when I need someone to hold me and be there and God is always there. I continue to write my steps, live the program and surrender to God and get my answers. I love that where ever I go I can take my recovery with me, like when I go home to South Carolina.

I can live my life without being angry, resentful and fearful. I don't have to be caught up in the Triangle of self-obsession. I can choose to be but I know that I don't have to be. Today I choose not to be. I have been thinking a lot about where I come from and I am just so thankful to the program of NA. I want to thank the other members of narcotics anonymous for being a part of my recovery. It's just been so many miracles and blessings. Learning to let go, turn my will and my life over, face my fears and talk about what I need to talk about. Those are blessings and miracles. It's about being happy, joyous and free for me. It's not that I don't have difficult situations but through step work I am learning how to react and respond to those situations.

I want to thank the literature review committee for asking me to share my experience, strength and hope.

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
ANONYMITY

A dictionary definition of anonymity is "a state of bearing no name". In keeping with this, the "I" becomes "we". The spiritual foundation becomes more important than any one particular group or individual.

As we find ourselves growing closer together the awakening of humility occurs. Humility is a by-product which allows us to grow and develop in an atmosphere of freedom and removes the fear of becoming known by our employers, families, or friends as addicts. Therefore, we attempt to rigorously adhere to the principle that "what is said in meetings stays in meetings".

Throughout our Traditions, we speak in terms of "we" and "our" rather than "me" and "mine". By working together for our common welfare we achieve the true spirit of anonymity.

We have heard the phrase "principles before personalities" so often that it is like a cliché. While we may disagree as individuals, the spiritual principle of anonymity makes us all equal as members of the group. No member is greater or lesser than any other member. The drive for personal gain in the areas of sex, property and social position, which brought so much pain in the past, falls by the wayside if the principle of anonymity is adhered to. Anonymity is one of the basic elements of our recovery and so it pervades our Traditions and our fellowship. It protects us from our own defects of character and renders personalities and their differences powerless. Anonymity in action makes it impossible for personalities to come before principles.
